Spiritual Disciplines for the Christian Life: Silence & Solitude

Biblical Proof for Silence and Solitude

- Jesus inaugurated His ministry by spending 40 days alone in the Desert (Mt. 4: 1-11)
- Before He chose the 12, He spent the entire night alone in the desert hills (Luke 6:12)
- When He received the news of John the Baptist's death, He "withdrew from there in a boat to a lonely place apart." (Matt. 14:13)
- After the miraculous feeding of the 5,000 Jesus "went up into the hills by Himself" (Matt. 14:23)
- Following a long night of work, "in the morning, a great while before day, He rose and went out to a lonely place" (Mark 1:35)
- When the 12 returned from a preaching and healing mission, Jesus instructed them, "Come away by yourselves to a lonely place." (Mark 6:31)
- Following the healing of a leper, Jesus "withdrew to the wilderness and prayed." (Luke 5:16)
- With three disciples He sought out the silence of a lonely mountain as the stage for the Transfiguration (Matt. 17: 1-9)
- As He prepared for His highest and most holy work, Jesus sought the solitude of the garden of Gethsemane (Matt. 26:36-46).

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Fear of Silence?:

"Silence strips us as nothing else does, throwing us upon the stark realities of our life. And in that quiet, what if there turns out to be very little to 'just us and God'?" –Dallas Willard

- Having deeper intimacy with God
- Growing in self-awareness as the silence invites the subconscious to move into deeper levels of knowing.
